Percent Accepted

- A college's percent accepted is for general reference only
- Ivy League rates range from 3 - 8%
- 2/3 of colleges in the U.S. accept at least 66% of applicants
- Ask for % accepted for specific majors or programs
- % can include acceptance into alternative pathways and co-enrollment programs
- Selectivity does not always equal quality



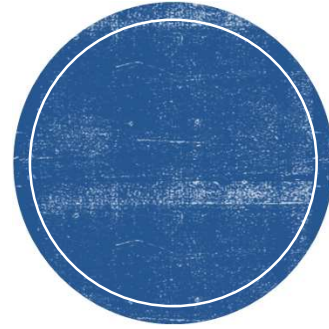

- **Goal – Finish testing before 12th grade**
- Applications for College Admissions open around August 1st before 12th grade
 - **Plan A** is for a student who started test preparation before 11th grade
 - **Plan B** is for a student who started test preparation at the beginning of 11th grade
 - **Plan C** is for a student who started test preparation after the 11th grade PSAT

NOTE: If your school offers a “School Day” test, take advantage of the offer

ACT[®] Testing Plan Options for 11th Grade

Plan	1 st Test	2 nd Test	3 rd Test
Plan A	December 2024 or February 2025	April 2025	June or July 2025
Plan B	April 2025	June or July 2025	September 2025

- **Goal – Finish testing before 12th grade**
- You do not need to take both the SAT[®] and ACT[®] Tests if you reach your testing goal on only one of the tests
- All colleges take either an SAT[®] or ACT[®] test
 - **Plan A** is for a student who is in Pre-Calculus or Calculus in 11th grade
 - **Plan B** is for a student who is in Algebra 2 in 11th grade

NOTE: The ACT[®] test can be a better test for some students who receive extended timed testing

Important Information on ACT Test Changes


- ✓ We recommend the paper test until the digital test has been vetted.
- ✓ The new digital test starts in April 2025. The paper test will not change until September 2025.
- ✓ The new ACT test will be shorter with more minutes per question and an optional Science section.
- ✓ When Science Reasoning becomes optional, we recommend students take it.
- ✓ When registering for the ACT you have an option to select paper or digital test sites. All locations have a paper test but only some locations offer a digital test.

Test Score Reporting

- You must request score reports be sent to colleges
[Collegeboard.org](https://collegeboard.org)
[Actstudent.org](https://actstudent.org)
- Request reports at least 6-8 weeks before deadline
- If a college asks for all scores, send all scores
- Colleges typically take your highest score or will “**Super Score**,” taking the highest component scores from multiple reported tests
- Some colleges allow self-reporting on applications with score verification before enrollment

NOTE: We do not recommend sending scores to colleges as part of your test registration. This allows you to be in control of all results to be provided to a college.



ABOUT TEST OPTIONAL COLLEGES

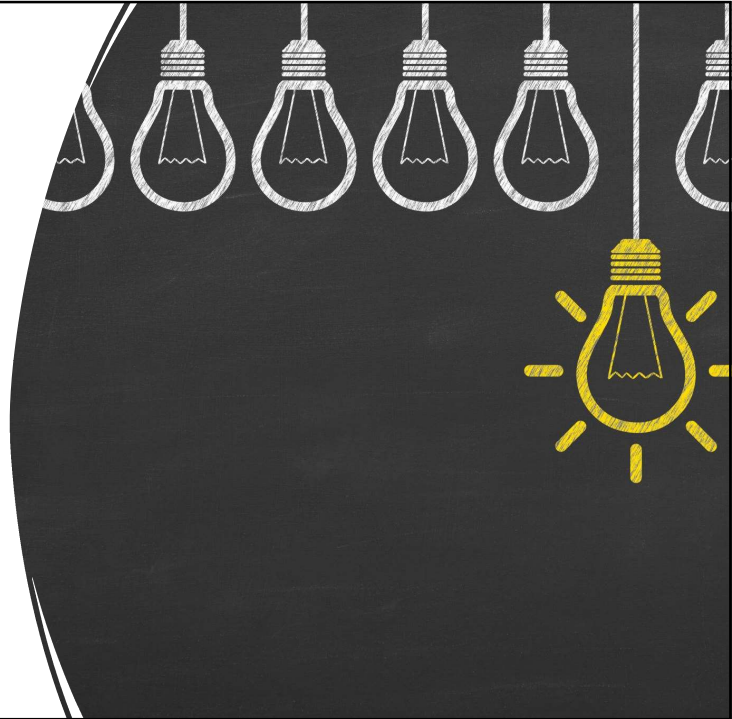
- Most students applying to multiple colleges could benefit from having competitive test scores
- Secondary college goals may require or consider test scores (*competitive majors, scholarships, and honors programs*)
- Some colleges are currently test optional for admissions
- Most colleges are not test-blind; they will look at scores if submitted



Use all the elements of the application to show evidence of your strengths and uniqueness.

Tell Your Story

1. The Application Form itself
2. All Evidence of Academic Achievement (9 – 12)
3. All Evidence of School & Community Involvement, Character, and Impact (9-12)
4. Any Evidence of Personal Qualities and “Fit” with the College (9-12)
5. Miscellaneous supporting items

Proprietary Applications

- Specific to the College

Common Applications

- Commonapp.org
- applytexas.org
- Coalition App (Scoir)
- University of California system
- And others

Most applications open in July or August before 12th grade



Application Deadlines

Decision offerings vary by college and can be found on their website

- **Regular Decision** = FINAL Application Deadline
- **Early Decision** – Binding decision for 1 college
- **Early Action** – Not binding; Get admissions decision early
- **Restrictive Early Action** – Not binding, but limits early applications
- **Rolling** – Applications are reviewed when the college gets them; Decisions are released quickly

Note: Colleges may have different deadlines for scholarships, honors programs, and financial aid (*check their website*)



After You Submit the Application

- Check your email for access to the college's application portal
- Complete other required applications/forms (*varies by college*)
 - ✓ **Self-Reported Academic Record**
 - ✓ **Scholarship Applications**
 - ✓ **Financial Aid Forms**
 - ✓ **Honors Program Application**
 - ✓ **Housing Application**
- Check the portal regularly for updates



Show Evidence of Academic Achievement

- SAT/ACT Test Scores
- High School Transcripts
- College/Dual Credit Transcripts
- Academic Honors and Awards
- Self-Reported Academic Record or Similar Reporting
- Additional Test Scores: AP, IB, A-Level, TOEFL, and others
- National Merit Recognition



Did you know that most colleges recalculate students' GPAs using their own formula?



Transcripts

- Gives a college
 - ✓ A record of academic accomplishment
 - ✓ details about your academic environment
- Get copies now and check for errors
- Only sent at your request to colleges

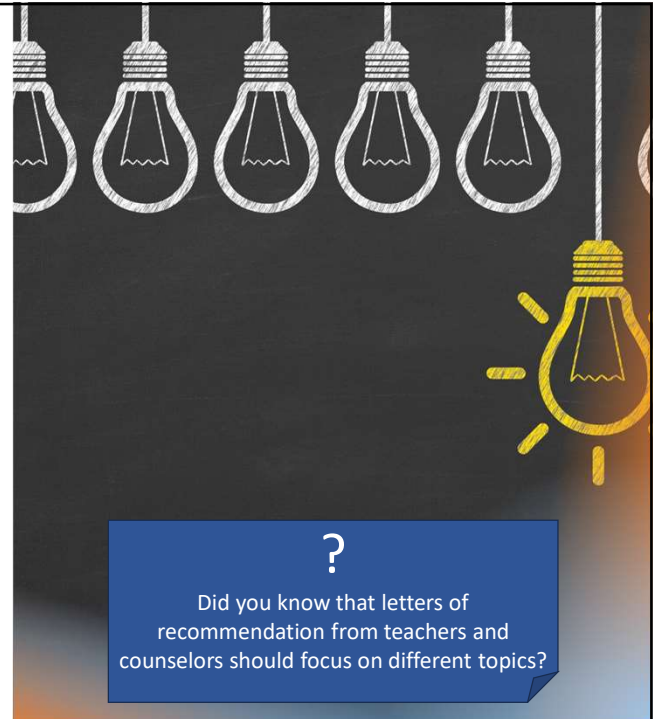
Send transcripts...

- Directly from all high schools and colleges attended by September 2025
- Understand your high school's request process
- Pay attention to your application deadlines

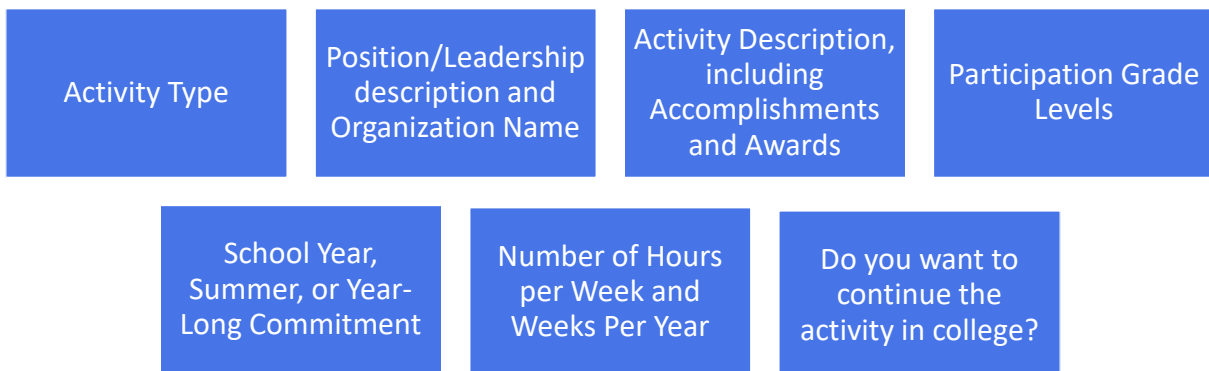

- Resume
- Activity List on Application
- Honors and Awards achieved
- Letters of Recommendation from Teachers, Counselor, and Other Individuals
- Creative or Research Portfolio

Résumé

Telling your story beyond the classroom

- **Some colleges let you submit a résumé with the application**
- **Can also be used for...**
 - Completing the activity list on applications
 - Sharing with a counselor who is writing a recommendation letter
 - Interviews
- **Structure**
 - Follow the college's directions (If a college doesn't want a résumé, don't send one)
 - Include education, activities, work experience, awards since end of 8th grade
 - Keep it simple and easy to read (1 to 2 pages usually)
- **Edit and Proofread!**
 - Be concise but detailed in descriptions
 - Convert to PDF for uploading and emailing



Recommendation Letters (Character References)

- Colleges require different quantities and types of rec letters
- Some colleges don't require any rec letters
- Most common: Counselor + 1 or 2 core subject teachers
- Some allow extra recommenders: coaches, volunteer coordinators, employers, etc.
- Usually submitted electronically
- Confirm receipt by the college
- Waive your access to see the letters (FERPA)



Ask in May 2025 for Rec Letters

Important: Ask about and follow the process at your high school

- **Teachers**

- Find 2-3 teachers from 11th grade who know you well, and like you
- Ask if they are willing to write a recommendation letter
- Some teachers have a Google form or questionnaire for you to complete
- If not, give each teacher a list of your classroom accomplishments

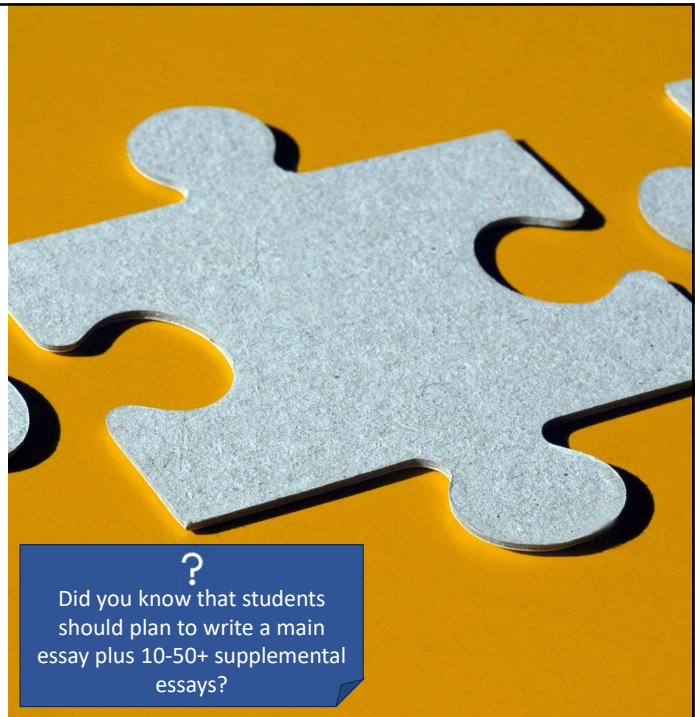
- **Counselors**

- Some counselors have forms for students and/or parents to complete
- Give the counselor your résumé
- Write a thank-you note and consider a small gift card to show your appreciation
- Provide a final list of colleges with directions for submission in the fall of 12th grade



Show Evidence of Personal Qualities and "Fit" with College

- Main essay/personal statement
- Supplemental essays for admission, honors, and/or scholarships
- Interviews
- Demonstrated Interest



Did you know that students should plan to write a main essay plus 10-50+ supplemental essays?

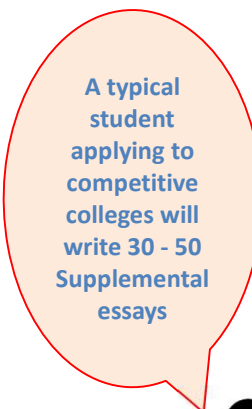
Main Essay (May-July)

- Most students write one main essay (sent to multiple colleges)
- Approximately 500-650 words
- Essay prompts are determined by the college or application provider
- Not a five-paragraph school essay
- Your first sentence needs to be amazing
- Need to tell a great story



Supplemental Essays (July-September)

- Most colleges have supplemental essays
 - Essay prompts are determined by the college
 - Can range from 1-8 per college
 - Average student writes 25-30 essays
- Common Examples:
 - Why this college?
 - Why this major?
 - What will you contribute to the community?
- Expect at least 2 - 3 revisions per essay



Interviews

Find Out:

- Are interviews required or offered?
- Requested or by invitation?
- Virtual or in-person?
- How and when to schedule (*varies by college*)

Prepare and Practice

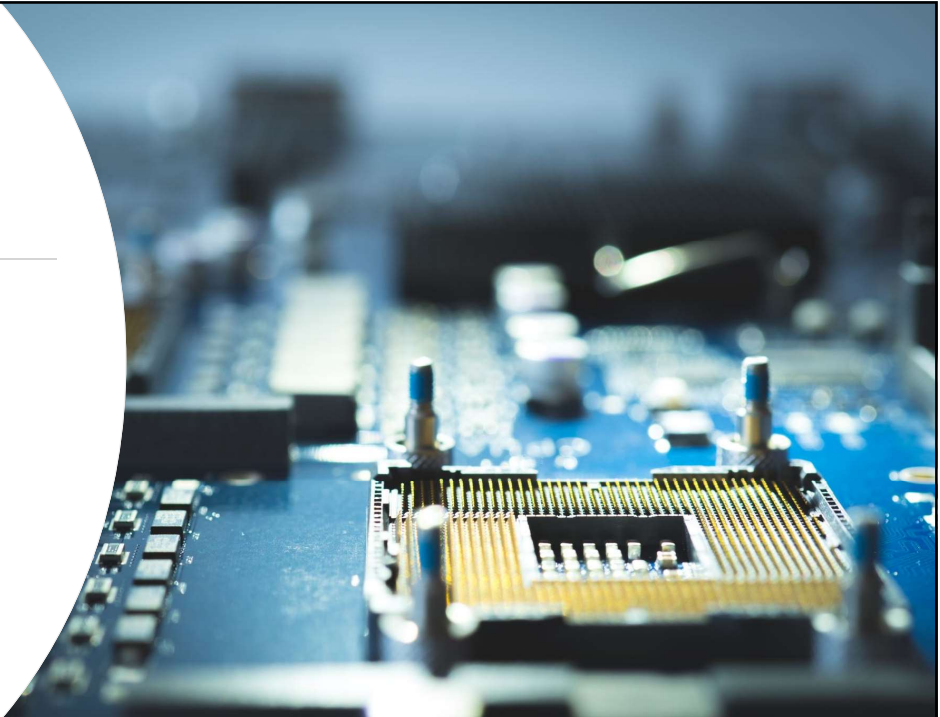
Reminders

- Bring a résumé
- Dress nicely
- NO parents!
- Follow-up with the college/interviewer



Miscellaneous Elements of Applications

- Auditions
- Academic Work Samples



Demonstrate Interest

▪ Actions

- Sign-up for contact lists on college websites
- Meet or email your admissions rep

▪ Attend Events

- College fairs
- College Rep visits at your high school
- Attend available college virtual events
- Make College Visits (*More info later*)

A Great College List Will Include



REACH SCHOOLS (1-3)

Low acceptance rate OR your profile is below the college's typically accepted range. Ivy League colleges are always reach schools.



MATCH SCHOOLS (2-4)

Grades, test scores, and activities are like the typical students at the college



LIKELY SCHOOLS (1-3)

High acceptance rate OR your profile is well above the average for admitted students



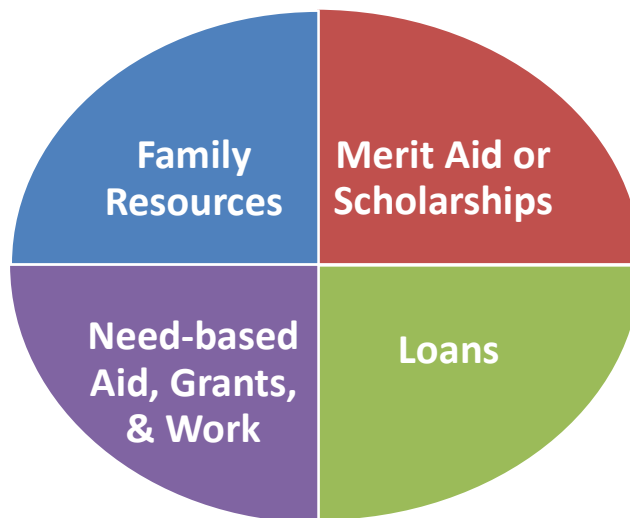
Get to Know the Colleges

 - Check college websites for options
 - Register in advance
 - Take family, not friends
 - Dress appropriately

The FAFSA

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

- Required to qualify for most merit-based scholarships and need-based financial aid
- Will open by October 1, 2025 (for Class of 2026)
- Will use 2023 tax information
- Fafsa.gov
- FAFSA required each year financial aid is to be received

The CSS Profile

- Will open October 1, 2025
- Used by \approx 300+ colleges & universities
- In addition to FAFSA
- Gives more detailed picture of family's finances
- Additional fee required



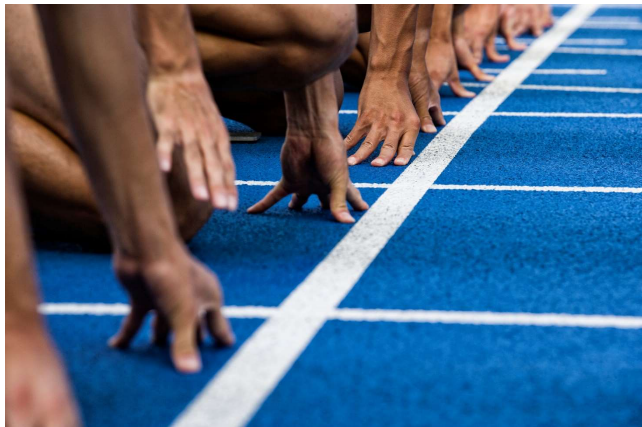


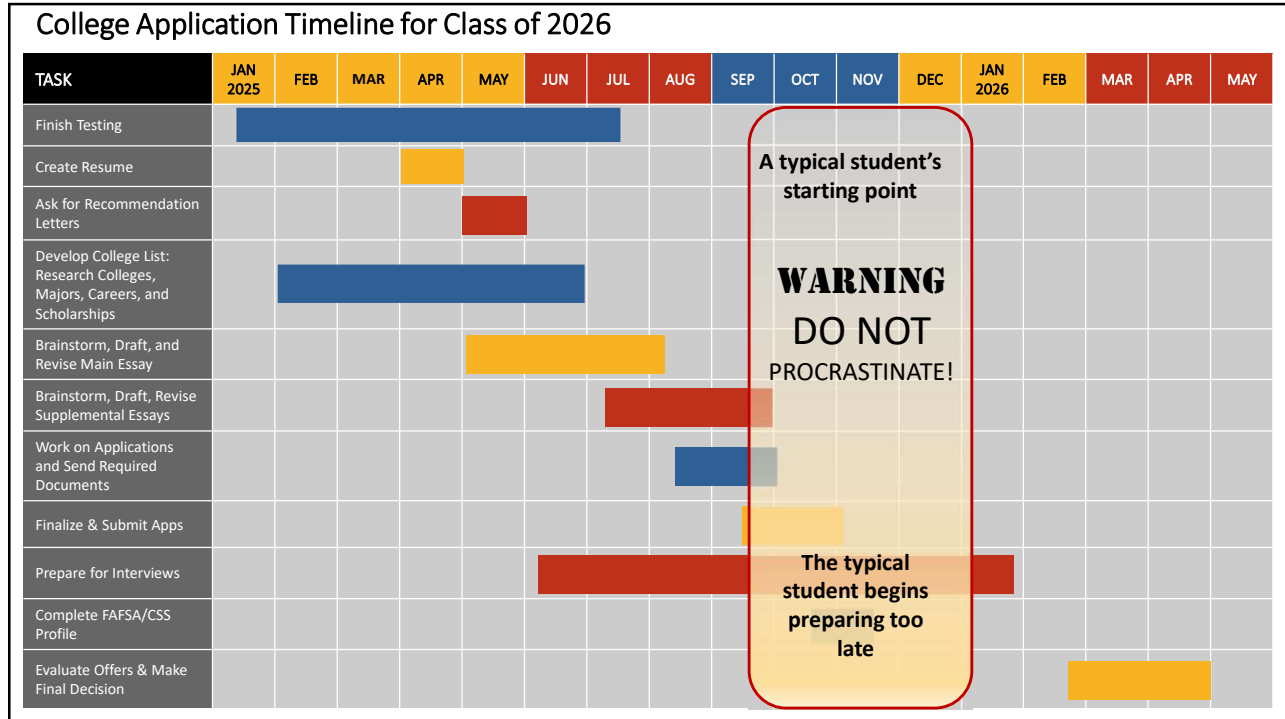
Paying for College Help
